3 Appointment MVV

If the decision is positive, your partner can make an appointment at a Dutch embassy or consulate in the country of origin. Or in the country where your partner lives. SUBMITTING DOCUMENTS

Explanation of documents

- The documents are an important part of your application. You can prove that you meet the requirements by submitting documents.
- If you do not submit all documents, the IND's decision will take longer.
- Submit the documents belonging to your application with this appendix. These documents are listed below. You do not need to send the pages with this list with your application.

- Are there any special facts or situations the IND must know about? For example, about your income? Then enclose a letter in which you explain the situation. And (official) documents proving this.

☐ **Copy of certificate of legal marriage**

Are you married according to the law? If so, send along a copy of the marriage certificate. This certificate is issued by the government of the country in which you are legally married. You can also submit a copy of another certificate showing that you are married.

☐ **Copy of certificate of religious/traditional marriage**

Are you married only religious or traditionally? If so, send along a copy of the certificate of your religious marriage or a copy of another certificate confirming your marriage. This could be a copy of proof of registration of your religious/traditional marriage in the registry of your country of origin. This is the country of your partner's nationality. This is possible only if registration is normal in this country.

☐ **Copy of your registered partnership certificate**

Are you and your partner in a registered partnership? If so, include a copy of the registered partnership certificate. This certificate is issued by the government of the country in which your legal partnership is registered.

☐ **Copy of supporting documents showing your relationship.**

Are you in a relationship but not married and not in a registered partnership? In that case, send photos, chats, messages on social media, letters, etc. or wire transfers to show that you are supporting your partner financially. Or the other way around.

☐ **Copy of proof of identity**

For example, a passport or identity card. Or a copy of another document proving the identity of your partner.

☐ **Passport photograph**

The passport photograph must not be more than 6 months old. It must be clear and sharp.

Who should complete this appendix?

Pursuant to Articles 3.77, paragraph 11 and 3.86, paragraph 18 of the Aliens Decree, every foreign national aged 12 years or older must complete this appendix.

Please note! This statement consists of 2 pages. You must complete **both** pages.

1 Declaration of the foreign national

On this form you fill in whether you have ever committed a crime or a criminal offence. These are crimes committed in the Netherlands and criminal offences committed outside the Netherlands. You must answer the questions with *Yes* or *No*. Not completing the form truthfully or failing to report is a criminal offence. This can lead to a sanction. Your answers may have consequences for your application or for a residence permit that you have previously received.
