

Application residence permit: residence with unmarried partner

Application by sponsor

About this form

You have a foreign partner. You are unmarried and not registered as partner. To live with you in the Netherlands, your partner needs a residence permit. And in some situations, a visa to travel to the Netherlands. This visa is called a provisional residence permit (MVV). With this application form you apply for a residence permit and, if needed, an MVV. Does your partner already have a residence permit? Then you apply for an extension or change of residence purpose with this form. In that case, make sure the IND has received the application before your permit expires, but not more than 3 months before expiration.

Before filling in the form

- Check the <u>requirements for this residence permit</u> on ind.nl/en/residence-partner. For example, your partner might need to pass an exam first. Read about the <u>civic</u> <u>integration exam abroad</u> on ind.nl/en/ integration-exam.
- Are you a Dutch national and have you lived in <u>another EU country</u> with your partner?
 Read on ind.nl/en/eu-law whether EU law applies to you.
- Does your partner have the nationality of a country of the EU, the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland? Read about <u>staying in the Netherlands as an EU, EEA or</u> <u>Swiss citizen</u> on ind.nl/en/eu-citizen.
- Check ind.nl/en/residence-child if you want your partner's minor child to come and live with you.
- First, collect all required documents. Read on ind.nl/en/documents how to have official foreign documents <u>legalised and translated</u>.

Filling in the form

Fill in the form digitally and then print it. Or print the form and then fill it in with pen. Always use a black or blue pen. Answer the open questions in block letters. Choose a selection box by filling it completely. If you made a mistake, cross out the incorrect box. And then fill in the correct box. Print the form in black and white or colour, on A4 paper and in full size.

Submitting the form

Send the form and the documents to: IND, postbus 16, 9560 AA Ter Apel.

After your application

- You will receive a letter explaining how to pay. Check the <u>costs of the application</u> on ind.nl/en/fees. If your partner does not get a residence permit, you will not get a refund.
- The IND usually takes a decision within 90 days. Sometimes it takes more time. For example, when not all required documents are submitted with the application. You can follow your application in My IND. You will receive the decision in a letter.
- Do not book a flight to the Netherlands before the decision. This avoids unnecessary costs if your partner does not get an MVV and residence permit.

MVV, CIVIC INTEGRATION AND TB TEST

6. Civil integration exam abroad

TB test 8.

When applying for extension of a residence permit

In case of a previous exemption or dispensation from the passport requirement. The declaration has to be issued by an official organisation. The statement shows that your partner is still in the same situation. And therefore cannot get a passport. Does your partner have a passport now? Then submit a copy of this passport. Only copy the pages with identity details. And the pages with travel stamps.

□ Copies proving change in situation

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



Processing of personal data

The Immigration and Naturalisation Service (IND) processes personal data when it processes your application, notification, or request. This means that if needed the IND will request data from you yourself and other organisations or persons. The IND also uses and stores data and shares them with other organisations. When doing so, the IND strictly adheres to the stipulations of privacy legislation. For instance, the IND must treat data safely and with due care. The law also gives rights.
